LEWISBURG - For businesses struggling to hire employees right now, it may be worth taking a look at an often overlooked or avoided group of people.

The Central PA Chamber recently teamed up with Union County Probation to hold a "Second Chance" job fair at the Union County Re-

source Center, Lewisburg. Throughout the day, Central PA Chamber members who are hiring met and conducted interviews with individuals looking to re-enter the workforce after several months or a couple of years.

"When (the Central PA Chamber) reached out to me about this job fair, I accepted immediately," said Carrie Hammond, Human Resources Manager for Icon Legacy Custom Modular Homes in Selinsgrove. "We

previously worked with Snyder County Probation and have hired many individuals who have been on work release or probation, and we have had a lot of success."

Between Icon and fellow job fair participants - T-Ross Brothers Construction, Thermo Fisher Scientific, USG and Cabinetworks Group there were well over 100 jobs immediately available. For a variety a reasons, finding workers has been no easy task. But, for many, considering individuals who have been out of the workforce because of past criminal offenses, it's a new venture.

"With spring time, we have a lot of positions that need to be filled, especially general laborers. Hopefully, it's a new opportunity to reach out to a new market and find some great employees."

> The event on March 9 was the second such fair of its kind, according to UC Chief Probation Officer Scott Kerstetter. He believes, despite any troubled history, that many people "still have a strong work ethic."

> The Central PA Chamber's involvement this go-around stems from an inspirational moment last summer. While participating in the virtual workforce summit, President & CEO Tea Jay Aikey was impressed by

the story of Craig Poole, General Manager of the DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel in Reading.

"His passion and willingness to work with those less fortunate, to see the greatness in everyone, and work against the odds by doing something others thought was crazy inspired me so deeply," Aikey said. "I immediately reached out to him, and then I opted to reach out to nearly a 100 different individuals looking for someone to give my

State Rep. David H. Rowe has served his local community in Snyder and Union counties through numerous roles for more than a decade while being involved with multiple charitable organizations.

He attended National Sun Yat-sen University in Taiwan and participated in its Mandarin Chinese Immersion Study after two years of Christian missionary work as an educator in southeast Asia. For the past nine years, Rowe has been the owner and operator of CrossFit Lewisburg, which employs several local residents. He attends the New Hope Lutheran Brethren Church in East Buffalo Township and is a leader of its music ministry. As an active leader in the local community, Rowe served as vice-chairman of the East Buffalo Board of Supervisors; secretary of the Union County Republican Committee; a member of the Capital Campaign Council of Evangelical Community Hospital; director of the Central Susquehanna Fire and Emergency Services board; and commissioner of the Buffalo Valley Regional Police Department, among other leadership roles. Rowe has financially supported the Expectations Women's Center, a pro-life pregnancy aid center in the Lewisburg area; the Buffalo Valley Recreation Authority; Union County Library; local youth sports clubs and more. As an East Buffalo Township supervisor, Rowe never voted to raise taxes or expand government regulations. These fiscally conservative policies will continue to be his top priorities as a state representative.

On Sept. 17, 2019, Rowe began representing Pennsylvania's 85th District in the Pennsylvania House of Representatives after a special election victory on Aug. 20. He was re-elected on Nov. 3, 2020. The district includes most of Union and Snyder counties, including Lewisburg, Middleburg, Mifflinburg and Selinsgrove.

Rowe currently lives in East Buffalo Township, Union County.



From 1883 to 1920, William A. Heiss manufactured carriages, wagons, and sleighs. When his buggy business declined he sought out other opportunities to make a living. Among those occupations were furniture maker, beekeeper, and automobile painter.

After William's death in 1931, the building was used for storage and the contents were forgotten.

Almost 50 years later, the doors were opened to reveal the original shop with tools, machinery, forges, and parts. It was as if William Heiss had simply walked away.

Your visit will begin in our modern Visitor Center, which features an introductory video, self-guided exhibit, hands-on workbench, gift shop and restrooms. thoughts a listen and just maybe my idea a chance. I had a few replies with most saying 'not interested', but Union County Sheriff Ernie Ritter thought it was worth a shot."

Ritter shared Kerstetter's contact information.

More than just an idea, Aikey knows members and businesses, in general, have been struggling to find and/or retain employees, even prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition to the Central PA Chamber and similar organizations providing training opportunities, this perspective was different.

"Having worked for a manufacturer that relocated, I know what it is like to find yourself out of work at no fault of your own and having the skills and work ethic, but needing an opportunity," Aikey said.

Kerstetter said finding "second chance" employers can be "difficult" and "discouraging" considering the stigma around people with criminal records, but he looks at it a little differently.

"Treat them how you would treat someone in your family that is struggling," he said.

But beyond building trust, there is support already in place and more on the way.

There is the Work Opportunity Tax Credit as well as federal bonding programs, serving as a hiring incentive tool targeting individuals whose background can pose significant barriers to securing or retaining employment, such as those with a criminal history.

In the future, Kerstetter would like to offer various forms of counseling to employees, including financial and maintaining a proper work-life balance.

His intent is to offer the job fair on a quarterly basis, with the next being planned for June.

"I've learned there is a lot of untapped talent out there," said Abbigail Pitts, Regional HR Business Partner for USG. "It's a good opportunity for people to get back into the workforce. Overall, it would be a great benefit to the community to have people reintroduced to the workforce."

PA CareerLink also had representatives at the fair, helping people with their resumes, CareerLink accounts and other services.

"I believe we have already started a great relationship, which is going to continue to develop and lead to many outstanding solutions and opportunities," Aikey said. "It will have a positive impact in so may ways on so many people and businesses in our region."

MILTON - U.S. Rep. Fred Keller, representing Pennsylvania's 12th District - which includes a large number of Central PA Chamber member businesses and organizations - made his first, in-person speaking appearance since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic a year earlier.

In order to abide by health guidelines, only a small number of Central PA Chamber Board Members and President's Club Members were permitted to attend the March 8 event in The Smith Room. However, several dozen more members were able to listen in via Zoom, a part of the Chamber's efforts to maximize its reach to members.

Many questions from the audience pertained to government funding related to COVID-19 as well as its immediate and longterm effects.

Alison Hall, a board member and owner of The UPS Store in Lewisburg, told Keller her business has been blessed because her services are needed now more than ever. With that, however, she is in need of additional employees, and the pool of candidates seems to be smaller due to unemployment benefits.

"I know they are beneficial to people, but as an employer, it's hard to find people," Hall said.

Fellow board member Todd Ross, President of T-Ross Brothers Construction, could relate. While his company is able to line up interviews with prospective employees, only a small percentage will actually show up for the actual interview.

Keller admits it's a difficult situation for employers, but is hopeful people will return to work when COVID-19 winds down.

"I don't fault the worker one bit; they are looking out for their families," he said. "But, it's certainly not healthy for the economy.

There were many more unknowns a year ago, Keller reminded, when people where told to stay home and not work, but he remains confident in a future turnaround because "people like to work."

Several other questions were raised and Keller planned to follow-up with each one.

The Central PA Chamber thanks Congressman Keller for making the visit as well as everyone who asked/submitted questions for the Legislative Event. The hope is to hold more throughout the year, as a way to help members better connect with their representatives at all levels.



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

The Squeeze-In

SUNBURY - The Squeeze-In, in Sunbury, was recently tapped as one of the 30 smallest restaurants around the world by cheapism.com.

In its description, the web site said, "This little dive in central Pennsylvania is almost impossibly narrow (stretch your arms out and you'll almost be able to touch both walls). It slings hot dogs for just five customers at a time, all of whom sit at a single worn counter. 


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
