MILTON – Veterans Day is already a special day when we as Americans take the time to honor our brave servicemen and women, but this year was made even more special for the Central PA Chamber of Commerce when it honored a longtime friend.

Jim King, of Winfield, who has volunteered countless hours with the Central PA Chamber over the last decade, was surprised on Veterans Day with a flag pole dedication, to honor his service to the organization. In addition, King is a veteran of the U.S. Army, serving two tours in Vietnam and many more years in other government roles. Earlier this year, he officially retired from his daily duties behind the reception desk at the Chamber, but he keeps in regular touch with the staff.

"I thought we should probably look at getting a flag pole for the Chamber, and what better but to honor Jim King," he said, during the midday dedication that included King's family, dozens of friends he made over the years and elected officials, including

state Rep. Lynda Schlegel Culver and Congressman Fred Keller.

The Chamber partnered with T-Ross Brothers Construction to install the flag pole on the northwest side of the building for all to see when they drive by. There is now also a plaque, ordered from On Fire Promotions, that reads, "In Honor of Jim King, a longtime friend of the Central PA Chamber."

The pole adorns a new U.S. Flag as well as a Pennsylvania state flag that once flew over the capitol building in

Around the same time as King's retirement, Ron Mackley, Chairman of the Chamber's Board of Directors, had the idea to add a special addition to the Chamber property at 30 Lawton Lane, Milton. Harrisburg. That flag and certificates from Gov. Tom Wolf and the House of Representatives was presented to King by Schlegel Culver, who has personally known the honoree for decades.

Become a better board member in 2022

MILTON - Are you ready to become a better non-profit board member in 2022?

Raising the Board (RtB), a program of the Central PA Chamber of Commerce and designed to build the skills and confidence of future and current members of non-profit boards, will be holding classes in 2022. However, organizers want to know when its most convenient for those interested to attend. If that sounds like you, contact program director Jeff Shaffer at jshaffer@centralpachamber.com or 570-742-7341.

Traditionally, classes are held for two hours over a course of four weeks, and it is open to Central PA Chamber members and non-members alike. The total cost for each person to attend is just \$99.

RtB started three years ago and has graduated 41 people to date, making them stronger representatives of the non-profit organizations they care about so much.

RtB covers a variety of topics that every non-profit board member should know and understand.

The 15 topics are broken down into four focus areas, known as the PAAC Model (Practice, Act, Apply and Connect). See full list of topics at www.centralpachamber.com/rtb and see the ad below.

The topics are presented by mentors who themselves have years - or even decades - of non-profit board experience. As topics are covered, all participants are encouraged to take part in the conversation to share their own personal experiences or thoughts on the subject matter.

"The thoughtful discussion among the students is often the best part," Shaffer said. "We can all learn so much from each other while building a sound foundation of non-profit board knowledge."

The most recent RtB session was held over the summer, and it graduated seven individuals. For the first time, people could attend the class in-person at the Chamber, near Lewisburg and Milton, or in the comfort of their own home or office via Zoom. This trend will continue,

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Time with Tea Jay

'We had the necessary things'

As the holidays are here, I felt it very fitting to share this writing I found after my Aunt Josie's recent passing. The church she refers to is Delaware Run Wesleyan Church, a Chamber member, and where she and I

attended together. I hope you enjoy it and gain some of her perspective.

"When MaryAnn asked me to speak of my most memorable Christmas, I didn't know what I could possibly say. I couldn't remember anything specific...Christmas was not big at our house. We didn't have much, but we always had plenty of food, and clean clothes, and love.

I do recall a doll...It was very special. It's legs and body were rubber, but the head was I believe plastic. I remember that my brother was throwing it up and catching it...until, it hit the ceiling and the head was cracked. It was still my doll (the only one I remembered), and I suppose I cried about it, but I had it until it turned brown from being in the attic.

I remember that we always played games. Bingo was the favorite, and when we would win, we would get an orange, tangerine, pop corn ball, or maybe a candy cane. We loved it, and we had a great time. Dad called the bingo, and Mother handed out the prizes. We were a family!

When I think about it...no wonder...nine children in 15 years. It was only recently that I realized how hard my parents must have struggled raising us. When someone brought me a picture that was published in The Daily Item. It was a school picture, and there were five of my brothers and sisters in the picture. WOW! I thought about that a lot. Five children in school, three at home, and one on the way. No wonder things were close. However, it did concern me. Why couldn't I remember more? I know I wasn't the smartest kid in the family, but shouldn't I remember more? So, I asked my brother, Ken. This is what my brother told me:

He said he remembered going to bed Christmas Eve. There were a few decorations on the tree and no presents. On Christmas morning, we all had gifts. What I learned from my brother was that many of these gifts came from the church...THIS CHURCH!

He also told me about the time when some of the church ladies came to the house to visit. The kids were playing outside in the snow. When he came inside, one of the ladies made some excuse to pull off his boots. He had no shoes on inside the boots. I don't know if it was Christmas, or another time. But all the children at home got shoes...from THIS CHURCH. Some of you may remember this...I don't really; but my brother does, and he will never forget.

One thing I can truthfully say is...I DON'T REMEMBER EVER BEING DISAPPOINTED BECAUSE I DIDN'T GET MORE. WE HAD THE NECESSARY THINGS, AND LOTS OF LOVE. WHICH, SAD TO SAY, IS NOT IN MANY OF THE HOMES TODAY.

King recalling his time in Vietnam

This story about Jim King was originally published in The Standard-Journal in 2015, when it recognized the 50th anniversary of troop on troop combat in Vietnam as well as the 40th anniversary of the Fall of Saigon, honoring area veterans. It was written by Editor Chris Brady. We appreciate him allowing us to reshare Jim's story.

WINFIELD - As a former intelligence officer with the Army, Jim King carries with him unique perspective when looking at the entirety of the Vietnam War. His involvement as an advisor with the Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN) provides insight into the effects of United States involvement, especially as troop withdrawal began in the early 1970s.

His second tour, which ran from August 1971 to July 1972, coincided with the Vietnamization Program championed by President Richard Nixon, which was designed to turn the war over to the Vietnamese. During that time, as the war continued to rage, American troops were being pulled out while ARVN troops continued to clash with North Vietnamese and Viet Cong (VC) soldiers.

It was a stark contrast to his first tour, when King served as an advisor from 1968-1969 with the ARVN 2nd Division.

"They were shuffling people across the country (by the early '70s), plugging people into holes, holes they needed filled," said King. "I had the good fortune of working with Major Pho (ARVN officer) during my first tour. When I returned, he was a general.

"Here was a man who could have gone home every night, but he stayed. He was among a group of men that had been through the French departure, the French defeat by the Viet Minh. Now there were new guys, the Americans, who had been fairly reliable. When you have a reliable ally, you tend to rely on them.

"Did they rely on us too much? Yes. We would get them stuff. In their positions, we would have done the same thing. We had the toys, the helicopters, the artillery, the support. They're human beings. There were good ones, there were bad ones."

While stationed in I Corps during his second tour, King saw the Easter Offensive by the North Vietnamese, which ran through October, after he had left.

Fortunately for King, he was stateside on R&R (rest and recuperation) around Easter, when he watched from home as his hooch burned in Quang Tri.

"I thought, 'I'm supposed to be there," remembered King. "They pulled us back from Quang Tri."

The assault was the first major push from the north since Tet of 1968 and began in March with a series of artillery attacks and tank assaults south of the demilitarized zone against ARVN firebases. The assault pushed the ARVN back and set the stage for the North Vietnamese push into South Vietnam.

"I'm sure the Vietnamese had their personal thoughts about us leaving," said King. "They knew we were going. The 3rd ARVN Division was a brand new division, formed in 1971.

"The attitude my second time around changed. I spent up close and personal time with lower-ranking ARVN because I had four teams in various locations and they were my direct liaison through the ARVN. The captain had a wife and three kids. He seemed to be a little dis-

tracted. He had to care for his family and his future and he knew we were going to leave."

King graduated from college a second lieutenant and in March 1962 landed in active duty at Fort Benning, Ga. He underwent intelligence officer training at Fort Holabird, Md., and was assigned in August to Fort Bragg, N.C., with the military intelligence detachment, 7th Special Forces Group.

By 1964-65, his detachment was transferred to the 5th Special Forces Group. President John F. Kennedy was putting more emphasis on special forces groups and special forces training.

As the buildup continued from 1962-66 in Vietnam, King got an 18month tour in Germany. It was a time when helicopter pilots were needed in force in Southeast Asia, much more than intelligence officers, he said.

In 1966, King was assigned to the Defense Intelligence Agency in Washington, D.C., where he spent the next 18 months. Near the end of that time, he got his orders for Vietnam.

By June 1968, King was headed to Vietnam, where he served with the Military Assistance Command Vietnam (MACV), assisting the 2nd ARVN (Army of the Republic of Vietnam) Division in Quonang Mgai in I Corps. King was the advisor to the intelligence officer for the 2nd ARVN Division, based in an old citadel in Qang Ngai.

"I was an advisor, but I was also a resource," said King. "I would coordinate Air Force airstrikes with the ARVN. I'd get feedback coming in from the American side, and feedback coming from the ARVN side."

During his second tour, he was attached to the 23rd Infantry Division in 1971, a time when troops were being pulled from the country as part of President Richard Nixon's Vietnamization Program.

"I had resources, in terms of intelligence, through the division, which I could use for planning," said King. "They were going home in three months, so how much planning can you do?"

King attended daily briefings with the general's staff and was given captured documents to analyze.

"We had fire support bases (throughout I Corps)," he said. "If we had VC coming through, I had additional resources I didn't before. We could keep from being blindsided."

There was an Air Force liaison in the Tactical Operations Center, which made it easier to coordinate support, King noted.

"If we had a Special Forces camp under attack at night, you went in and said, 'We need to do something.' You had all these assets available. The ARVN - they had to come to us for that support."

One the 23rd Infantry Division was pulled from Vietnam, King went south to Saigon, then flew to Quang Tri Province, where he served as an advisor for the 3rd ARVN Division.
