

How long have you been in business? I started my business in October of 2021. What makes your business unique?

In our business, we use a drone for achieving a better, closer look at roofs, chimneys, gutters, two-story windows, or anything two stories and above. During the flying of the drone, pictures are taken and then placed in the report that is send electronically to the client and the client's realtor. This is normally completed within a 48-hour window after the inspection. I am a FAA certified drone pilot for commercial use. The drone is only used when conditions are satisfactory and depending on granted permission to fly in areas that permission is required.

What is a service that people are surprised to learn you offer?

When inspecting roofs that are less than two stories high, I use a gutter protector with the ladder. This helps to minimize damage to the gutters from placing the ladders against it and also holds the lad570-538-1490




