LEWISBURG - It was a near picturesque day for the 21st Annual B&E Golf Tournament, held Friday, June 24 at Bucknell Golf Club, Lewisburg.

Nearly 100 golfers and dozens of volunteers filled the course in support of the Central PA Chamber's 501(c)(3) organization, the Central PA Business & Education Association, which provides career exploration, leadership training and more for area students.

By the time all numbers are totaled, B&E will have raised approximately \$15,000 in support of its programs.

Many Central PA Chamber members support this tournament in various ways, from sponsorships and donations, to playing in the tournament and volunteering.

This year's Master Sponsor was ClearView Asset Protection, which fielded two golf teams, one even including former Pittsburgh Steelers Wide Reiver Yancey Thigpen.

However, this football star turned golfer and all of the other teams were bested by the foursome of Mike McNier, Jim McNier, Ron McNier and Micah Koch, with a score of 53.

At this four-person scramble tournament, players can strategically

use mulligans and a "gimmie" to improve their team's score.

Right before the 1 p.m. shotgun start was the 7th Annual Golf Ball Drop!, sponsored by Service 1st Federal Credit Union. Always a spectacle, hundreds of individually numbered golf balls are dumped from around 30 feet up, over a practice green at BGC. The three golf balls that fall into - or closest to - the designated hole win a portion of the cash collected for the contest. The winners have been determined and will be presented with their prizes in a fashion similar to Publishers Clearing House. Names and pictures will appear on the Central PA Chamber's Facebook and Instagram pages and in the August issue of IYB, available on the Chamber's website at www.centralpachamber.com.

"It was another outstanding event," said Chamber President & CEO Tea Jay Aikey. "This was the first time in my 11 years with the Chamber that there was not a sole person in charge of the entire event. This year it was a 'divide and conquer' effort by the internal team, and it went incredibly well.

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

Health and wellness screenings scheduled

LEWISBURG - Community Health and Wellness at Evangelical Community Hospital will hold a series of screenings through the month of July.

For the safety of participants, masking is required while in Hospital facilities and during all in-person screenings. Physical distancing and frequent handwashing/use of hand sanitizer is encouraged as participants move through the screening process.

Hearing Screening: 9 to 11 a.m. Monday, July 18, at Surgical Specialists of Evangelical, 25 Lystra Rogers Drive, Lewisburg. This free screening is for anyone who has noticed a change in their hearing or have others tell them that they are not hearing as well as they used to. Krystal G. Decker, AuD, Audiologist, is administering the hearing screens, and during the screen will talk about the changes you may be noticing, offer education on caring for your ears, and explore options for assistive devices if needed. Appointments required.

Comprehensive Blood Screen: 6:30 to 11 a.m. Tuesday, July 19, at Family Medicine of Evangelical, 412 W. Market St., Middleburg. A low-cost comprehensive blood screening can provide important details about your health, sometimes before symptoms of a condition surface, giving you and your physicians the power to plan ahead. A \$50 fee includes lipid panel (HDL, LDL, total cholesterol, and triglycerides), complete blood count, and CMP (blood sugar, electrolytes, calcium, protein, liver enzymes etc.). An alternative to your employment woes

"Help wanted...Now hiring...Sign on bonus... Be patient, short staffed...Closed today due to staffing issues..."

These are signs we all see everywhere on a regular basis. It is both frustrating and baffling

considering the number of open employment positions in every sector and trade.

Businesses that suffered through and survived the pandemic are now closing their doors because they cannot keep steady workers to produce their products or provide their kind of customer service. This pains me.

There is a program the Central PA Chamber of Commerce recently participated in, and it just may be the gateway to you finding your next new hire.

YES to the Future is an internship program, offering a real work experience to young adults that allows them to explore career areas they want to follow to become productive members in our communities.

The program objective is to provide the eligible participants with meaningful work experience and basic work skills to help them develop their occupational potential.

By way of the paid internship, the participants will acquire marketable skills, decent work habits and attitudes as well as a sense of job responsibility.

As a work site participant, your role as the employer is summarized as follows: Conducting orientation and safety training; outline duties; instruct and supervise; model good work habits; and, provide a supportive work environment and safety equipment, if required.

Did I mention you do not pay the intern? By way of the YES to the Future program, the participants are temporary employees of the Central Susquehanna Intermediate Unit (CSIU) and therefore are paid by the CSIU for up to 30 hours per week for a maximum of 240 hours.

All applicable withholdings and insurances, including worker's compensation are in place through the CSIU.

This program is available for Lycoming, Northumberland, Snyder, Union, Mifflin, Clinton, Columbia, Montour, and Centre counties. Should your paid intern become a good fit, there is a next step after the completed initial time.

You can become their OJT (On-the-Job Training) employer. This allows you assistance with covering the costs associated with training for the specialized skills needed for the position at your company.

If this program sounds like something you want to put to work for your company, don't hesitate to reach out as we've just participated in the program and would be happy to share our experience.

Central PA Chamber earns award

YORK, PA – The Central PA Chamber of Commerce was honored with the 2022 Community Investor Award by the Manufacturers' Association (MA) Tuesday evening, June 14, in York.

Chamber President & CEO Tea Jay Aikey accepted the award at MA's Annual Event, held at the PeoplesBank Park minor league baseball stadium.

"I was astonished that the Central PA Chamber of Commerce was being recognized as the 2022 Community Investor by such an outstanding organization," Aikey said. "It was a whirlwind experience attending their event, and I look forward to continuing to do work worth of such recognition." MA cited the Central PA Chamber's growth of 85 percent over the last decade – despite the worldwide pandemic – as one of the reasons it was selected. Fur-

thermore, the Chamber has be-

come known as an active

member in many area communities, making a positive differ-

ence and involving others to take part.

The Chamber also notably helped secure tax-free status for nearly 200 acres of land in Northumberland County to bolster economic growth. It has already lead to development in the last few years.

"Manufacturing is a big part of our history, and we continue to remember and support those efforts," Aikey said.

The evening's event was headlined by keynote speaker Richard Phillips, who was captain of the Maersk Alabama cargo ship, when it was hijacked by Somali pirates in 2009. He bravely put himself in harm's way and offered himself as a hostage. The siege ended after a rescue


Acute Rehab and Orthopaedic Units, specific to financial resources, human resources, materials/supplies, policy management, and patient care activities on a 24-hour basis.
