### **Camp Mount Luther closes out summer season**

MIFFLINBURG - Camp Mount Luther recently ended their summer camping season.

Around 433 participants took part in programs during the sevenweek session, the first held in two years due to the pandemic. Before campers arrived, the staff participated in two weeks of intense training. Upper Susquehanna Synod Bishop Barbara J. Collins installed staff on June 17 at the Upper Susquehanna Synod Assembly at Susquehanna University.

This summer, 230 campers enjoyed on-site programs including mini, day, traditional, specialty, and family camps. Campers got to do crafts, go swimming, play games, camp out, hike, and sing during their time at Mount Luther.

This year's theme was "Boundless: God beyond Measure." Campers learned about God's boundless goodness, love, welcome, forgiveness, and generosity. Through the camp's method of studying the Bible, called "GROW Time," staff helped campers Gather and Reflect On the Word throughout their day, culminating in an evening worship service.

LEWISBURG - According to the U.S. Department of Labor, employment in healthcare occupations is projected to grow 16 percent from 2020 to 2030, much faster than the average for all occupations, adding about 2.6 million new jobs.

Healthcare occupations are projected to add more jobs than any of the other occupational groups. This projected growth is mainly due to an aging population, leading to greater demand for healthcare services.

Evangelical Community Hospital in Lewisburg is taking proactive steps to prepare students interested in healthcare-related careers to meet the future demand through a unique program that allows them to experience many aspects of care.

This year's class included 13 individuals, made up of students having completed their sophomore, junior or senior years at schools throughout the surrounding districts. The students must have a grade point average of 3.3 (88 percent) or better and the willingness to experience different areas of the healthcare environment.

The 72-hour internship program provided 24 hours in the classroom and 48 hours of one-on-one interaction with staff and patients. Hospital educators teach the students a variety of skills including CPR certification, lifting and transfer techniques, and personal care skills. The classroom training includes various presentations by supporting clinical areas in the Hospital, as well as learning how to care for a patient. This includes bathing, oral hygiene, making the bed, and completing paperwork.

The high school students of this year's class came from four school districts, including: Lewisburg, Line Mountain, Midd-West and Milton.

The students began classroom training in mid-June and were placed in different rotations in varying departments, including: Obstetrics, Acute Care, Orthopaedics, Intermediate Care Unit, Imaging Services, Wound Clinic, Emergency, Intensive Care, and One-Day Surgery following their classroom instruction.

Students can use their summer experiences at the Hospital to meet job shadowing requirements while experiencing firsthand a career path they might wish to pursue.

### Yaw, Culver tour Evan

LEWISBURG - In August, state Sen. Gene Yaw and state Rep. Lynda Culver toured Evangelical Community Hospital's plant facility. While on tour, Hospital staff were able to talk about the new 750-ton magnetic bearing chiller, a higher quality, more efficient chiller that will increase capacity, provide redundancy, and provide chilled water to the Hospital under emergency power.

The visit comes after both Yaw and Culver vigorously supported state funding through two separate grants totaling \$900,000 for Evangelical's effort to increase its energy efficiency.

Both grants, which are products of the Office of the Budget's Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RACP), are in the process of being fulfilled to fully receive the promised funds.

The grant expands the Hospital's \$1.9 million Efficiency Initiative, a project which will reduce the Main Campus's energy consumption by more than 394,000 kWh annually and allow for efficient cooling of the Patient Room Improvement, Modernization, and Enhancement (PRIME) project.

RACP is a Commonwealth grant program that was created for the acquisition and construction of regional economic, cultural, civic, recreational, and historical improvement projects.





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
