Life and long-lasting impact

LEWISBURG – Central PA Chamber members left with new tactics to find work-life balance, while four more were given the illustrious Chamber Impact Award following the Annual Meeting & Awards Ceremony on Oct. 26 at Silver Moon Banquet Hall, Lewisburg.

There was a record-setting crowd of 224 people to hear from Bucknell University Men's Basketball Head Coach John Griffin III, and to see the Impact Awards presented for the 10th consecutive year.

The theme of the event was "Finding Balance". Griffin, a former player for the Bison who graduated in 2008, became the 22nd head coach of the program last spring. He started by saying he was excited by the energy in the

room, because more and more, relationships seem to be "transactional". Despite the college basketball season being underway, it was an opportunity he couldn't refuse, even if it went against the principle of work-life balance.

"Believe it or not, in our world of coaching, it's a very hot and important topic," Griffin said. "Burnout is very real."

He acknowledged the several dozen business owners and organizational leaders in the room. He rightfully assumed they all work very hard for their success, and some version of balance is becoming increasingly difficult to achieve. So, Griffin offered advice via six bullet points on what has worked for him personally to alleviate stress and exhaustion, which is a common by-product when one is out of balance.

The first point was time management and prioritizing "WMI (What's Most Important)".

"Before you know it, you have 10 things on your list that look equally important, but they're not," he said. "Find what will help you win the day. It will lessen the stress in your mind." He then talked about being able to recognize quality over quantity. "Every step of my career that has been blended as I'm formerly a 'tasker'," Griffin said. "But, you don't feel connected and feel exhausted. The quality didn't meet the expectation level.

> "I've quickly recognized that short, focused interactions are more important than quick touch points.

> Having a flexible mindset was his third point. While you hope everything goes as planned, you have to understand there are a number of things out of your control, he said. "It has helped me leave the office less stressed."

Don't forget about yourself, Griffin said, making his forth point. "Exercise clears my mind, but finding something

self-care related where you spend time on yourself is wildly impactful."

In his fifth point, he said to seek advice as there are many that have gone before you. Also, one should practice efficiency over obsession. "I'm always learning something different," Griffin said. "I've found mentors that I'm unafraid to talk."

And, lastly, he said to celebrate the small wins, recalling a time he blew the whistle during practice as a player came to a new understanding on the court.

"You have to work to find balance," he said. "Ultimately, relationships are number one, and happiness is hard to find if you're not looking for it."

He ended the speech by inviting everyone to first game of the season, coming up on Monday, Nov. 6. See page 7 for details on special ticket pricing!




It will start at 11 a.m. Thursday, Nov. 9 at The Piers Art Park, 539 Cherry Alley, Lewisburg.

"The PA Council on the Arts is excited to support the Lewisburg Downtown Partnership and its community partners as they reimagine, revitalize, and activate the Piers Art Park. Community-driven efforts like the Piers Art Park demonstrate that creativity, the arts, and the creative sector are integral to community revitalization by retaining and attracting residents, visitors, and investment," said the Council's Executive Director Karl Blischke.

For decades, Lewisburg's own standing stones have been overlooked, the Piers, an arc of 32 concrete monoliths, is one of the most prominent industrial ruins in town. Organizers have begun to hold and envision more site-specific art, music, theater, and dance performances, community Yoga and Tai Chi, and art classes all open to the public. Through programming, they plan to encourage community members to take ownership of this space on a level not previously possible. Providing increased opportunities to create and enjoy art improves a community's quality of life, and will lead to Lewisburg becoming a more desirable town to visit and reside in. Increased programming and performances on Market Street support small, locally-owned businesses, shops and restaurants. The hope is that it will lead to increased entrepreneurship with new. unique businesses and experiences to make the downtown more vibrant and relevant.

The Borough has recently received County and DCNR funding to accomplish goals that are in line with the vision of an Art Park.


